Summary:	<p>On 25 June 2020, ICANN org issued its notice of intent to terminate the .aigo Registry Agreement to Aigo Digital Technology Co, Ltd. (herein referred to as "Aigo"), the Registry Operator for the .aigo gTLD.</p> <p>Aigo was issued a Notice of Breach by ICANN Contractual Compliance on 30 March 2018, and ICANN org initiated termination proceedings through mediation and arbitration. ICANN org prevailed in the arbitration proceeding and Aigo failed to cure its material breaches of the RA, including breach for non-payment of fees, by the 1 June 2020 deadline set forth in the arbitration award.</p> <p>On 25 June 2020, based on provisions set forth in section 4.5 of the .aigo Registry Agreement, ICANN org made its Determination to not transition the .aigo gTLD to a successor registry operator and to terminate the .aigo Registry Agreement. As such, the .aigo gTLD is ready for revocation from the root zone.</p>
